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Research at Leiden University

[Leiden University](#), founded in 1575, is a research university.

Fundamental research is the main objective and the education provided is largely research-based. Fundamental research is typically curiosity-driven and its courses and findings are usually unpredictable. Leiden University believes that fundamental research is crucial to the development of modern society and the future prosperity of mankind. At Leiden we aim to create an inspiring atmosphere for researchers and students.



As a research University, [Leiden University](#) focuses on fundamental research and research-based education. Fundamental research is typically curiosity-driven and researchers develop their curiosity through their observations. In science and technology, unexpected outcomes or practical problems are often at the basis of research into the most fundamental characteristics of nature. Fundamental research frequently leads to new insights into the essence of nature, the human mind, and the complex interactions between their elements. From this starting point, innovations, new developments and solutions to old problems emerge.

In our globalizing world, universities have to face growing, intense competition, both in research and teaching. To maintain and further strengthen our excellence in research, choices have to be made. For this reason, Leiden University has selected [11 research profile areas](#), most of them with a strong multidisciplinary focus. These areas offer ample opportunity for first-class fundamental research, but they are also strongly linked to key issues prevalent in modern national and international societies. In the coming years, Leiden University will do its utmost to facilitate excellent research and to stimulate multidisciplinary collaboration in these profile areas:

1. Asian modernities and traditions
2. Bioscience: the science base of health
3. Brain function and dysfunction over the lifespan
4. Fundamentals of science
5. Global interaction of people, culture and power through the ages
6. Health, prevention and the human life cycle
7. Interaction between legal systems
8. Language diversity in the world
9. Political legitimacy: institutions and identities
10. Translational drug discovery and development
11. Vascular and regenerative medicine

Leiden University strongly believes that the education it provides benefits directly from the high quality research that is carried out within the University itself, and that new fundamental knowledge is new intellectual capital. The most recent academic insights are immediately integrated into the courses.
